

but smiles and enthusiasm could be seen all over their faces as they studied the items to ensure that they chose just the right one







Junior Beta Club members volunteered as greeters, ushers, and assisted with the lighting of the Christmas tree.



SCMS Loves Real-World Science

The Middle School welcomed well-known meteorologist David Tolleris (or "D.T." as he likes to be called), on November 21st, when he made a presentation and spoke to 6th and 7th grade science and STEM students. D.T. explained that he was an energy and agricultural meteorologist who after working many years in the public and private sectors, began his own private forecasting company and website www.wxrisk.com. The 7th graders had just completed a unit about weather phenomena and measurement. They had been introduced to various types of weather maps like the ones that D.T. showed them, highlighting weather phenomena, during historic and more recent storms, and bringing particular focus to the

Sussex County area on the map. At one time, D.T. worked for the local

weather station in Wakefield, and was very familiar with the local area. He emphasized with seriousness and humor the importance of looking at information about our world with the perspective of a scientist, using the approach of the scientific method, and to be skeptical and critical of much of the information in our world. In other words, he advised students to always evaluate information like present day scientists and scientists through history have done.

Students were intrigued when D.T. showed and discussed real historical examples that were believed to be real science at one time,



though today with the approach of scientific thinking, we know are not true and even seem to be nonsense. D. T. spoke of the importance of his job and the many who depend on the information that he provides about short term and long term weather. He presented photos and spoke of what can happen when forecasts are inaccurate. He said that the sciences and math school subjects that proved most important for his job today were science, including Earth Science, Chemistry, Physics, Algebra, and Geometry. He said that although in school he had at one time struggled with math, he advised students to stick it out because it would really be worth it in the end.

SCPS Students Take the Red Ribbon Pledge


